

JAMES R. GALLAGHER
CLALLAM COUNTY SHERIFF 1911-1915**

WORDS FROM THE SHERIFF

This year's featured sheriff is James R. Gallagher. Gallagher was elected and served two terms as Clallam County Sheriff from 1911 to 1915 (sheriff terms were two years back then). He was a young man of 32 when elected and was also supervisor of the Clallam County Road Department at the same time. Unfortunately, our record retention system does not retain information from that long ago, but through his grandson, Terry K. Gallagher, the present day Port Angeles Chief of Police, we know the following:

- He was born January 13, 1879 in Peshtigo, WI and moved to Washington around the turn of the century.
- He owned and operated a livery stable near what is now Front and Lincoln Street.
- After leaving the office of sheriff, he continued to work as the Clallam County Road Department supervisor until 1929 when he went back into law enforcement as a deputy under Sheriff Pike.
- In 1936 he was hired as a police officer for the city of Port Angeles. He worked his way up through the ranks to the position of Captain. He retired in 1950 at the age of 71.
- While a police officer in Port Angeles, Officer Gallagher was involved in a shootout with a robber of the liquor store located where Kokapelli's Grill is now.
- His son, Gilbert (Chief Gallagher's uncle) was a Whitman county deputy sheriff killed in the line of duty in 1949 during an incident regionally known as the "Easter Massacre" in Pullman, WA.
- He remained active in the community through the Elk's Naval Lodge (he was the Exalted Ruler), the Knights of Columbus, the Peace Officers Association, and the Queen of Angels Catholic Church.
- He died in 1966 at the age of 87.

We are privileged to have our history and culture shaped by such dedicated and professional law enforcement officers as Sheriff Gallagher.

OPERATIONS SECTION



THE OPERATIONS SECTION OF THE CLALLAM COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE INCLUDES PATROL, DETECTIVES, TRAFFIC, AND MARINE UNITS. STAFFED BY HIGHLY TRAINED LAW ENFORCEMENT PROFESSIONALS, THESE INDIVIDUALS ARE AVAILABLE 24 HOURS A DAY TO RESPOND TO THE NEEDS OF OUR COMMUNITY.

DEPUTIES ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR INVESTIGATING AND HANDLING ALL CRIMES OCCURRING IN THE UNINCORPORATED AREAS OF CLALLAM COUNTY. A DEPUTY MAY RESPOND TO ANYTHING FROM A BARKING DOG TO A BURGLARY IN PROGRESS OR A HOMICIDE. IT IS THE DEPUTY'S RESPONSIBILITY TO BE THE FIRST RESPONDER NO MATTER THE NATURE OF THE CALL, AND DEAL WITH THE SITUATION UNTIL ASSISTANCE CAN ARRIVE.



THE CLALLAM COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE HAS FOUR DETACHMENTS. THE DETACHMENTS ARE LOCATED IN SEQUIM, PORT ANGELES, FORKS, AND CLALLAM BAY. THE ONE-MAN PATROL CONCEPT IS USED IN CONJUNCTION WITH COMMUNITY ORIENTED POLICING. THE DEPUTIES ARE ASSIGNED TO AN INDIVIDUAL CAR FOR CALL OUT AVAILABILITY. THE DEPUTIES ASSIST OTHER AGENCIES AS WELL RECEIVING ASSISTANCE FROM THOSE AGENCIES AND HAVE FORMED A MUTUAL RELIANCE.



THE PATROL TEAM IS PART OF THE OPERATIONS DIVISION AND IS MADE UP OF FIVE SQUADS WITH EACH LED BY A PATROL SERGEANT. FOUR OF THE SQUADS ARE IN THE PORT ANGELES-SEQUIM AREA AND THE FIFTH SQUAD COMPRISES THE WEST END AREA. THERE ARE A TOTAL OF 26 DEPUTIES IN PATROL WHICH INCLUDES ONE SERGEANT AND FOUR TO FIVE DEPUTIES PER SQUAD.



THE DEPUTIES PATROL ABOUT 1,754 MILES IN CLALLAM COUNTY. DEPUTIES HANDLED ABOUT 17,151 CALLS FOR SERVICE IN 2013. IN A LOT OF WAYS, THE DEPUTIES WORKED WITH COMMUNITY MEMBERS TO RESOLVE AND MINIMIZE PROBLEMS IN WELL REGARDED WORKING RELATIONSHIPS.




DETACHMENT I - SEQUIM



THE SEQUIM DETACHMENT IS CO-LOCATED WITHIN THE SEQUIM POLICE DEPARTMENT AND IS KNOWN AS THE EAST END DETACHMENT. THE AREA HAS THE LARGEST POPULATION AND IS THE FASTEST GROWING OF ALL PARTS OF THE COUNTY.



DEPUTIES RESPOND TO NUMEROUS CALLS FOR SERVICE FROM THE NUMEROUS RESIDENTIAL AND SUBURBAN AREAS OF THIS PART OF THE COUNTY. DEPUTIES ASSIGNED TO THIS AREA PROVIDE JAMESTOWN S'KALLAM TRIBE WITH LAW ENFORCEMENT SERVICES AND ASSIST THE SEQUIM POLICE DEPARTMENT.



DETACHMENT II – PORT ANGELES DETACHMENT

DETACHMENT II IS LOCATED AT THE COUNTY SEAT IN PORT ANGELES AND IS THE SHERIFF'S OFFICE HEADQUARTERS LOCATED IN THE CLALLAM COUNTY COURTHOUSE.

THE DETACHMENT EXTENDS TO ABOUT THE MID-WAY POINT BETWEEN PORT ANGELES AND SEQUIM TO THE EAST, AND EXTENDS TO THE TWIN RIVERS AREA ALONG THE COAST AND LAKE CRES-CENT. TO THE SOUTH, THE DETACHMENT IS BORDERED BY THE OLYMPIC NATIONAL PARK AND TO THE NORTH, THE STRAITS OF JUAN DE FUCA.




DEPUTIES ASSIGNED TO THE AREA ASSIST POLICE OFFICERS FROM THE LOWER ELWHA KLALLAM TRIBE, PORT ANGELES POLICE DEPARTMENT, AND THE NATIONAL PARK SERVICE. WE ENTERED AN AGREEMENT WITH THE JAMESTOWN S'KLALLAM TRIBE TO HANDLE ALL THEIR TRIBAL LAW ENFORCEMENT ACTIVITIES AND FUNDING FOR TWO DEPUTY POSITIONS .



DETACHMENT III & IV WEST END DETACHMENT

DETACHMENTS III AND IV ARE SITUATED IN THE MOST NORTHWESTERN CORNER OF THE COUNTY AND, FOR THAT MATTER, THE MOST NORTHWESTERN PART OF THE CONTIGUOUS UNITED STATES OF AMERICA. TOGETHER, THE TWO DETACHMENTS COVER OVER 1/2 OF CLALLAM COUNTY AND PROVIDE SERVICES TO SIX COMMUNITIES AND OVER 10,000 RESIDENTS. LARGELY FORESTED AND UNPOPULATED, THE WEST END DEPUTIES ARE GIVEN RESIDENT STATUS AND RESPOND TO CALLS IN THE VARIOUS COMMUNITIES. IT IS THE LARGEST AREA TO PATROL GEOGRAPHICALLY.



THE FORKS DETACHMENT OFFICE IS CURRENTLY LOCATED OUTSIDE OF FORKS. DEPUTIES ASSIST THE FORKS POLICE DEPARTMENT, THE QUILEUTE TRIBAL POLICE IN LAPUSH, MAKAH TRIBAL POLICE IN NEAH BAY, DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES, OLYMPIC NATIONAL PARK, U.S. COAST GUARD, AND JEFFERSON COUNTY IN A WIDE RANGE OF TASKS. THE FORKS AREA COMPRISES THE LARGER POPULATION OF THE WEST END AND DEPUTIES RESIDE THERE. THE WEST END DEPUTIES INVESTIGATE AND RESPOND TO CALLS IN BOTH DETACHMENTS.

MARINE PATROL UNIT

THE MARINE PATROL UNIT IS STAFFED BY SPECIALLY TRAINED DEPUTIES WHO PATROL THE LAKES, STRAITS OF JUAN DE FUCA, AND THE PACIFIC OCEAN. THE DEPUTIES CONDUCT JOINT PATROLS AND WORK WITH VARIOUS STATE AND FEDERAL AGENCIES SUCH AS THE WASHINGTON STATE FISH AND WILDLIFE, U. S. BORDER PATROL, AND U. S. COAST GUARD.



THE MARINE UNIT HOSTED THE 2013 WASHINGTON STATE MARINE LAW ENFORCEMENT CONFERENCE AND IT WAS A SUCCESS.



THIS YEAR MARINE UNIT MEMBERS PARTICIPATED IN ON-THE-WATER FIREARMS TRAINING EXERCISES. THE MARINE UNIT PATROLLED 486 HOURS, COMPLETED 956 SPOT INSPECTIONS, AND 849 WRITTEN INSPECTIONS, INVESTIGATED 10 BOATING ACCIDENTS, AND PUBLIC SAFETY PRESENTATIONS FOR 2013.



FIREARMS TRAINING UNIT

THE FIREARMS TRAINING UNIT COMPRISES SIX FIREARMS INSTRUCTORS FROM OPERATIONS AND CORRECTIONS AND IS RESPONSIBLE FOR THE CLALLAM COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE OVERALL FIREARMS TRAINING, FIREARMS ACQUISITION, TESTING, AND EQUIPMENT DEVELOPMENT. THE UNIT IS STAFFED BY SUPERVISORS AND DEPUTIES UNDER A RANGE MASTER.



THE UNIT CONDUCTS BASIC/ ADVANCED PISTOL TRAINING, PATROL RIFLE TRAINING, FIREARM QUALIFICATIONS, AND REALISTIC BASED FIREARMS TRAINING AND EXERCISES MEETING THE DEPARTMENT'S NEEDS FOR OPERATIONS AND CORRECTIONS PERSONNEL AND PROVIDES TRAINING FOR AREA LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES.



THE FIREARMS TRAINING UNIT IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE DEFENSIVE TACTICS UNIT PROVIDES SCENARIO BASED REALISTIC TRAINING WITH ROLE PLAYERS IN VARIOUS SITUATIONS THAT MIGHT BE ENCOUNTERED ON DUTY. THIS INCLUDES ACTIVE SHOOTER TRAINING ALONG WITH A USE OF FORCE SIMULATOR TO COMPLIMENT THE CRITICAL ON GOING FIREARMS AND USE OF FORCE

MESSAGE FROM THE COMMANDER

The OPNET Program continues to be an important and successful law enforcement unit serving the needs of citizens in a two county area. Since 2012, this unit has excelled in its performance and productivity, mostly due to the supervision and quality of personnel assigned. Their dedication and tireless work ethic has propelled OPNET into the go to section for any agency in a two county area.

Funding remains questionable in each fiscal cycle. Seizures, once the foundation of a strong budget, are not what they once were. Legalization of marijuana and drug trends, such as methamphetamine, has contributed to the lack of valuable assets available to forfeit. Courts too have taken a harsher view of forfeitures forcing us to make different decisions when electing to seize property. To add to this, economic times and struggles are unprecedented in our history, and funding through grants and seizures is an increasing challenge. While other areas in our state are seeing some economic rebound, Clallam and Jefferson Counties continue to see difficulty. This has contributed to some property crime increase and may have some influence in the presence of controlled substance. Still, the executives that make up the Policy Board of OPNET have indicated a serious commitment in seeing that the program continues.

Because of the excellent support from our law enforcement executives, assigned investigators and staff and even the citizens of our area, OPNET will continue to be the effective unit it is for drug, gang and major crime enforcement for years to come.









OPNET's primary focus is removing drug dealers from our community by identifying, locating, apprehending, and prosecuting suspects who deliver Heroin, methamphetamine, cocaine, and prescription medication such as Oxycodone. The past year there were 21 major arrests and convictions for drug trafficking and delivery.



SPOTLIGHT ON SUPPORT SERVICES VOLUNTEER KAREN CLATANOFF



Support Services is so very lucky to count Karen Clatanoff as one of our priceless (and tireless) volunteers.

Karen has been with our department since 1994 and works 8 hours each week. Because of her consistent work schedule and administrative skill set we have been able to rely on Karen to manage three separate areas of responsibility. One is our False Alarm Registration Program which involves the monitoring of false alarms responded to by our deputies. She monitors the dispatch logs each week for alarm responses and uses an index card system to track the registrations and false alarm incidents. Each week she types up the Alarm Notification Letters to alert and/or remind the home or business owner of the County's False Alarm Ordinance and bills them as appropriate. There has been a steady increase in the amount of alarms registered due to the success of our Blockwatch Program's promotion of proactive security measures for business and homeowners.

Karen also handles our Stolen Property/Missing Persons Validation program managing the records of identifiable stolen vehicles/guns and records of missing persons that are entered into the statewide/national ACCESS database. These are done on a monthly basis and Karen types up each stolen item's validation letter to send out to the victim. Then, depending on whether or not the victim verifies the item is still stolen, she leaves the item in the system or removes it. These validations require documented actions and owner signatures, all of which are audited by ACCESS on a bi-annual basis which we have passed due to Karen's thoroughness.

Karen also types up the Concealed Pistol Licenses issued weekly by our office. In 2013, she typed up 1554 licenses, mailed the license to the applicant, entered the license data into both our law enforcement criminal records (LERMS) database and the Department of Licensing (DOL) database, and then filed the paperwork. This duty is more like a project each week, because the background process is cumbersome and moves the approval process along in batches so Karen handles stacks of these licenses at a time and sometimes the numbers are staggering to process during her one 8 hour day for the week.

Prior to the year 2012, Karen typed these licenses on a manual typewriter. Now she is provided with the DOL Firearms On-Line system and uses that system exclusively. However, the manual typewriter still serves its purpose for creating the Alarm letters, Validation letters, and mailing envelopes.

We are dependent on Karen for her skills managing these duties, but most importantly we appreciate Karen for her friendly and professional attitude. Her dedication to assisting criminal justice agencies throughout her life is to be commended and shows in how much of her time she shares with us at the Sheriff's Office. Karen never misses giving us 8 hours even though she has a full schedule the other 6 days of each week.

As with other sections in our department, the numbers keep rising and keep us on our toes. Our dedicated and hardworking team members continue to produce results by periodic review of our processes to ensure we are streamlined but thorough. We continue to utilize and maintain technology for concealed pistol license issuance, civil paper processing, law enforcement records management, and sex offender registration and monitoring. In 2013 we implemented a county-wide automated Public Records Request processing system that allows for on-line service to our citizens. The team members who are the primary users of these various systems are responsive to manufacturer upgrades and participate in focus groups to positively impact future enhancements to the systems. We recognize the need to stay current and efficient using the best tools available to us.



OPERATION STONEGARDEN

During the year of 2013 the whole of Clallam County was able to utilize funding from U.S. Department of Homeland Security Operation Stonegarden Grant Funds from the Federal years 2010, 2011 and 2012. These grants are awarded to Clallam County, administered by Clallam County Sheriff's Office staff, and the funding is distributed to the Sheriff's Office and sub recipients: Forks Police, La Push Tribal Police, Lower Elwha tribal Police, Neah Bay Tribal Police, Port Angeles Police Department, Sequim Police Department, Washington State Department of Fish and Wildlife, and Washington State Patrol.

All of the recipients benefited from the upgrades to the radio communication system. We were able to purchase 40 additional radios for officers that are dispatched by PenCom. These radios were programmed to include radio frequencies for cooperating inter-operable agencies, plus frequencies that could be used in a disaster. The grants also funded a portable antenna system and generator to allow for portable communication in areas where the existing permanent towers were ineffective.



The Operation Stonegarden Grants were able to provide protection and enhancement to our Deputies and Patrol Officers by providing additional portable radios, 17 ballistic shields and 93 spike strips. These items were distributed throughout the county to the individual agencies depending on the number of commissioned officers and the need in that agency. Collectively, over 400 hours of man hours were distributed in 2013 to enhance the patrol in our County and we were able to provide training for several officers and deputies at the WISNIA and Northstar conferences.

Individual Sub recipients were provided items specific to their needs, Neah Bay Tribal Police purchased In Car Camera Systems, Port Angeles Police- 2 additional MDT's for their vehicles and more Wireless Access Points for their inter-city communications.

Our emphasis of Operation Stonegarden FY12 was to provide replacement of patrol vehicles to facilitate the enhanced patrols made available by the grant. Forks Police Department purchased a transport van and the van cell for the interior, Port Angeles Police Department purchased a fully outfitted patrol car, La Push Police a fully equipped utility vehicle, and Lower Elwha Tribal Police an ATV and a UTV. The Sheriff's Office purchased two fully outfitted patrol cars that were delivered in 2014.



WORDS FROM THE CHIEF


With the close of 2014 clearly on the horizon, we are reminded just how quickly 2013 came and passed in a flurry.

I am grateful for the continued opportunity to lead and to serve the dedicated men and women working in our Corrections Facility.

During 2013 the Corrections Section devoted many hours to the development of policies and procedures as well as making preparations for implementation of the Federal PREA standards. Implementation is scheduled for the fall of 2014 and will bring to a close a two year project funded by the Department of Justice and carried out in partnership with Just Detention International. Several visible changes to the facility directly connected to the PREA Project was the installation of mirrored window coverings and striping in the jail corridors.

2013 brought with it several personnel changes the most noteworthy being the retirement of Chuck Henke after 31 years of dedicated service to the citizens of Clallam County. Chuck remained the consummate professional throughout his career with the Sheriff's Department and I thank him for his service and I value deeply our friendship.

In the Summer of 2013 Lexipol released the "Lexipol Custody Manual" containing a vast set of best practices standards for Jail operations. The Clallam County Corrections Facility will be taking on the task of modifying and applying these standards to establish Policies and Procedures that reflect the Lexipol model.




2013 PREA Update

P.R.E.A. stands for Prison Rape Elimination Act, and it is Federal Law that effects corrections facilities on the Federal, State, and Local level. A key element of PREA on the Federal Level is a zero tolerance for sexual misconduct by staff, and prisoner rape. This is and has been the policy of our Department, however with PREA it is a more formalized codification of this policy. We have partnered with Just Detention International to become a test case for implementation of PREA standards in a medium sized jail facility. In the corrections Section several staff members have been a part of the program, however Sergeant Peterson and Corrections Deputy Newhouse have been the main organizers and participants with Just Detention International (JDI). Much of what they have been doing will lay the ground work in the coming years for implementing new standards inside the jail facility, and much of what they have been working on centers around sheriff's Department Policy, as well as staff education and training, as well as inmate education about the program.

In preparation for the implementation of PREA in our jail one of the biggest challenges was preparing the various services that need to be available for inmates while in our facility. Sgt. Peterson, Deputy Newhouse, and JDI worked with Healthy Families of Clallam County to facilitate agreements and working relationships towards this end.

Policy and Procedure Development continue to be a challenge we are working on, but we are confident this will be ironed out before we implement our new PREA standards in 2014.

JAIL MEDICAL UPDATE FOR 2013

ON MAY 15TH 2013 THE CLALLAM COUNTY CORRECTIONAL MEDICAL DEPT GAVE IT'S VERY FIRST EDUCATION AND ADMINISTRATION PRESENTATION AND PRESCRIPTION FOR THE LIFE SAVING DRUG NARCAN OUT TO AN INMATE RELEASING FROM CUSTODY.

NARCAN IS THE ANTIDOTE TO OPIATE OVERDOSE. STUDIES HAVE SHOWN THAT THE TIME FOLLOWING RELEASE FROM A CORRECTIONAL FACILITY OR DRUG TREATMENT IS THE MOST VULNERABLE TIME FOR AN OPIATE IV DRUG USER TO OVERDOSE. TIME IS SPENT EXPLAINING THE DANGERS OF OPIATE USE VIA INTRAVENOUS ADMINISTRATION, OVERDOSE AND THE PROBABILITY OF OVERDOSE IF THE INDIVIDUAL USES IV OPIATES. IF AN INMATE COMES INTO THE JAIL WITHDRAWING FROM OPIATES THEY ARE OFFERED EDUCATION AND THE OPPORTUNITY TO LEARN ABOUT NARCAN AND ITS ABILITIES AND LIMITATIONS. A PRESCRIPTION IS FAXED TO A PHARMACY OF THE INDIVIDUALS CHOICE WHERE THEY PAY FOR AND PICK UP.

DR. ARTHUR TORDINI JOINED THE JAIL MEDICAL TEAM JANUARY 2013 AFTER 32 YEARS OF SERVICE AT THE OLYMPIC MEMORIAL CENTER EMERGENCY ROOM. HE BRINGS WITH HIM A TREMENDOUS AMOUNT OF EXPERIENCE, EXPERTISE AND SOMETHING ELSE THAT IS VERY IMPORTANT TO THE CCCF MEDICAL DEPT: THE CONCEPT OF TEAM WORK FROM ALL OF HIS YEARS WORKING IN THE ER.

IN 2013 WE SERVED 147,432 MEALS BETWEEN THE JAIL, JUVENILE SERVICES, AND OUR STAFF AT A COST OF ABOUT \$1.29 PER MEAL, USING APPROX. 26,300 INMATE MAN HOURS. WE SUPERVISE AND TRAIN INMATE WORKERS AND EDUCATE THEM ABOUT FOOD SERVICE AND MEAL PREPARATION.

WE HANDLE ALL OF THE CLOTHING, BEDDING AND CLEANING PRODUCTS FOR THE JAIL INMATE POPULATION. WE ALSO HAVE THE MOBILE KITCHEN AVAILABLE FOR SPECIAL EVENTS AND NEEDS. ON A YEARLY BASIS WE SET UP AND HELP WITH THE COUNTY BREAKFAST AND ALSO SERVE COFFEE AND GOODIES FOR ANY DEPARTMENT GATHERING. WE ALSO PROVIDE FOOD FOR OUTSIDE OPERATIONS.


Window Tinting and Painting

IN THE FALL AND WINTER OF 2013 THE HALLWAYS AND CELLS WERE PAINTED ON GRAVEYARD.



AT LEFT IS THE WINDOWS PRIOR TO TINTING AND PAINTING BEING DONE. ABOVE IS THE SAME AREA AFTER WORK WAS COMPLETED. BELOW YOU CAN SEE B DECK FULLY PAINTED, AND WINDOWS TINTED. THE GREEN LINE IS FOR INMATES WALKING DOWN THE DECK TO PREVENT THEM FROM LOOKING IN TO CELL, OR RECOGNIZING PEOPLE IN THE HALLS FROM INSIDE

THE TIME AND EFFORT REQUIRED TO PAINT THE CELLS IN THE JAIL WAS ENORMOUS. CELLS HAD TO HAVE THE OCCUPANTS REMOVED, THE CELL HAD TO BE CLEANED, THE PAINTING OCCURRED, AND AFTER A DRYING PERIOD THE INMATES WERE ALLOWED BACK IN TO THE NOW CLEAN CELLS. GRAVEYARD TOOK THIS PROJECT ON AND IT HAS MADE A HUGE IMPROVEMENT TO THE CLEANLINESS AND IMAGE OF THE JAIL.



SHERIFF'S CHAIN GANG

THE CHAIN GANG IS THE MOST VISIBLE PART OF THE CORRECTIONS SECTION IN OUR COMMUNITY. THEY TAKE INMATE WORK CREWS OUT THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY ON VARIOUS JOBS AND TASKS TO HELP THE ROAD CREW KEEP THE ROADWAYS SAFE FOR VEHICLES, PICK UP LITTER ALONG THE ROAD, AND DUMP-SITES ALL OVER THE COUNTY. IN 2013 WE HAD THREE CHAIN GANGS WORKING FOR THE ROAD DEPARTMENT PERFORMING A HOST OF TASKS, THE DEPARTMENT OF ECOLOGY LITTER GRANT FUNDED A CHAIN GANG LITTER CREW, AND THE FOREST SERVICE FUNDED A CHAIN GANG INTERMITTENTLY THROUGHOUT THE YEAR. THE PROGRAM CONTINUES TO BE POPULAR WITH THE CITIZENS OF CLALLAM COUNTY, AND THE INMATE WORKERS WHO GET AN OPPORTUNITY TO DO SOMETHING PRODUCTIVE WITH THEIR TIME WHILE IN JAIL..

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT SECTION

The year 2013 proved very successful in our efforts to expand our outreach and increase our volunteer corps as a force multiplier. Emergency Management added sixty newly trained Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) members to our roster. Peninsula College was one of our new sites with 15 staff and faculty members becoming certified in CERT. We also added six new Map Your Neighborhood communities to our program. We also connected with new untapped groups of Clallam County citizens to grow our numbers.

Undersheriff Peregrin has been leading the effort to engage Department Heads and Elected Officials in preparedness and planning activities to build a cohesive Continuity of Operations Plan that incorporates all the departments serving Clallam County. The program was kicked off with a two day training held at Olympic Medical Center in September with fifty leaders in attendance. University of Maryland Center for Health and Homeland Security trainers facilitated our completion of FEMA MGT 333 – Preparing the States: Implementing Continuity of Operations Planning. A Clallam County coordinating committee continues to meet and guide the Department Heads through the tasks to complete our County Continuity of Operations Plan.



Additional training was provided by LCDR Katie Blanchard of the US Coast Guard on the best COOP planning tools to use to get the plan started. As this training was held in December, LCDR Blanchard took advantage of the season and had the participants build a COOP plan for Santa and the elves in the face of disasters. This was one of our more popular trainings. Undersheriff Peregrin thanked LCDR Blanchard for her work on Clallam County's behalf with a Sheriff's Coin and a Clallam County mug.

In July, connections with the faith based communities and the school districts resulted in 25 new volunteers being trained as the Clallam County's first team of Community Points of Distribution workers. Their work is focused in recovery efforts following disasters and catastrophic events. This CPOD volunteer corps will deploy to assigned food/water drop sites to distribute commodities to citizens driving or walking through the specific sites. This FEMA training was the EMD4026 CPOD Managers Course and has set the foundation for emergency management to develop and further train volunteer groups to serve at fifteen distribution sites throughout Clallam County.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT SECTION



We continue to partner with the Olympic Peninsula Chapter of the Red Cross to work together in training health care providers and parents to be Functional Assessment Service Team (F.A.S.T) volunteers who will serve at our shelters and on evacuation transit vehicles to work with children, elders, and vulnerable populations during emergencies and disasters. Three staff members of the Clallam County Developmental Disabilities Department completed the trainings as well as representatives from the Lower Elwha Klallam Nation and the Makah Nation. Clallam County joins Kitsap County Emergency Management and Pierce County Emergency Management as the first three counties in Washington to add this F.A.S.T. resource to their response and recovery programs.

A boost in communication capabilities came through our purchase of the Last Mile Portable Communications and Incident Command System (PCICS). The PCICS functions on satellite, fiber, copper, microwave, 3G/4G, WiFi and other land based links to provide a robust portable communication system that fits in a couple of pelican cases. Eight tablets are key components of this system that also enables "Radio over IP" and acts as a software link to the radio network when used with our ACU1000 exchange unit. The tablets are pre-loaded with FEMA ICS-compliant event tracking documentation and recovery application forms. This \$39,967.00 communications suite includes the PCICS, a solar generator, and a Blue Sky Mast 55' portable tower system that increases our communications reach. This purchase was through part of the Clallam County StoneGarden Grant.

2013 saw the addition of the tenth All Hazard Alert Broadcast Siren to our early warning and notification communications county wide system. The latest siren was installed at the Morse Creek-Four Seasons Ranch beach front in 2013. The Four Seasons Homeowners Association worked with the Clallam County Sheriff's Office/Emergency Management Unit and Washington State Emergency Management to make this new early warning system happen here. The \$50,000.00 cost for the AHAB Siren installation and equipment is covered by Department of Commerce funds administered through the Washington State Emergency Management Earthquake/Tsunami program. Clallam County and State Emergency Management Departments continue to maintain, test, exercise and activate all of our sirens both by satellite and local hand-held radios.

Sheriff's Citizens Advisory Committee

This Board was established by the Board of Clallam County Commissioners Resolution No 76, 2007, to create a committee to advise the Sheriff's Office on issues of concern to him, his staff, deputies, and the community and to provide an open link of communication between the Sheriff's Office and the community.

Positions currently remain open for representatives of Forks, Makah Tribe, Quileute Tribe and Elwha Tribe.

COMMUNITY POLICING

The Clallam County Sheriff's Office is committed to Community Policing through partnerships with the citizens and businesses in the County. The basic concept of Community Policing is to bring together law enforcement and the public to work as a team in an effort to improve the community in which we all live. Community policing is an effective and proactive process which has proven to reduce crime, improve communication between the public and law enforcement as well as reduce the fear of crime.

Our Community Policing Team is led by Lorraine Shore, Administrative Coordinator and an amazing cadre of volunteers who donate thousands of hours each year to the Sheriff's Office. We have an active Neighborhood Watch program in Clallam County which is extremely successful thanks to our volunteers who dedicate their time and efforts to the citizens of Clallam County. Working in close partnership with the Code Enforcement Team, our Community Policing Team has made a significant impact on the quality of life for many of Clallam County's residents.

Each year the Sheriff's Office participates in events throughout the County designed to provide education to residents about the many services and programs the Sheriff's Office offers. The programs include, Neighborhood Watch, Project Lifesaver, Radar Trailer, Map Your Neighborhood, Volunteers in Police Service, Anonymous Tip Reporting Service, Child Passenger Safety Seat Technicians and the new Clallam County Alert System which replaced NIXLE.

The Sheriff's Office holds an annual BBQ on Law Enforcement Memorial Day which brings together law enforcement officers from around the County to remember those who gave their lives in the line of duty. This BBQ is made possible through donations from community members and the hard work of the Sheriff's Volunteers who serve approximately 200 law enforcement personnel at the event.



The Sheriff's Office is honored to have 83 Volunteers who gave 9,704 hours of service to the Sheriff's Office and their Community in 2013. 




