

WORDS FROM THE SHERIFF

On behalf of the dedicated Clallam County Sheriff's employees I am proud to present our 2015 Annual Report. This is a brief summary of what we accomplished in 2015 captured in pictures and words.

We have added some crime statistics from the Washington Association of Sheriffs and Police Chiefs (WASPC). It is a numerical breakdown of the reported crimes in unincorporated Clallam County in 2015 with comparison numbers from 2014. In general, our crime rate is about half the average crime rate in Washington State. Our crime rate has followed the general trend in the state (and nation) of long term decrease in crime. Violent crime (assaults, murders, rape etc.) has shown a greater and more sustained drop over the past 25 years. Clallam County has also shown a marked drop in violent crime over the same period.

Nationally, property crime appears to have bottomed out about five years ago and has been fluctuating since. In Clallam County, however, we have seen a slight increase over the past 5 years of burglary and theft. There is, and has been, a strong correlation of illegal drug use with shoplifting, burglaries, car thefts and other property crimes.

We are responding to the increase in property crime through aggressive investigation and prosecution of these crimes as well as reaching out to all county residents to organize neighborhood watches and take measures to avoid being a victim of crime. It is hard to measure crime that has been prevented, but we are seeing property crime rates flatten, and hopefully will decline in the coming years.

Other measures we have adopted to reduce property crime as well as recidivism in the jail are medically assisted treatment for opioid addiction and mental health screening/treatment in the jail. We have partnered with Peninsula Behavioral Health to provide mental health services and referrals in the jail. Additionally, our medical staff began screening opioid dependent inmates for treatment with Suboxone, a prescription drug that assists in treating opioid addiction. Our featured sheriff this year is Sheriff Billy Nelson. As you will see when you read his biography, he was elected at a young age (24) and died four years later. Those were exciting years, though, and Sheriff Nelson was involved in many exciting law enforcement events in the short span of four years.

FEATURED SHERIFF



True West Mysteries. |

Sheriff Billy Nelson, Clallam County, 1922.

Sheriff Billy Nelson was elected Clallam County Sheriff in 1920 when he was 24 years old and served until 1924 when he died at the age of 28 from an accident in the line of duty which resulted in blood poisoning.

On March 24, 1922, two burglars entered the vault of the State Bank of Sequim walking out with \$22,000 in cash, jewelry and negotiable securities and headed towards Discovery Bay. It was later determined that Albert Ernest "Frisco Whitey" Browning, one of the burglars, was a former salesman for burglar-proof vaults.

At Maynard on Discovery Bay, two Clallam County Deputies, Rex McInnes and Joe Priest, having been sent by Sheriff Nelson, caught up with the burglars. McInnes was standing guard on the logging railroad trestle that led down to the log dump of the Discovery Bay Logging Company. He saw a man rummaging at the rear of a beach shack and called to him to stop. The man shot Deputy McInnes in the hip. Deputy Priest came to his aid and carried him to the Maynard general store and called for more help.

Port Angeles Police Chief Van Welch, Jefferson County Sheriff Philip Chase and hundreds of armed men responded to the area. The next evening, two armed men entered a logging camp taking money from the loggers and in the process shot and killed logger, Ray Light. This event appeared to be related to the bank burglary, however it was later discovered that these two major incidents were unrelated.

Sheriff Nelson called Seattle Criminologist Luke S. May into the case after a week turned up no sign of either pair of suspects. Sheriff Nelson still suspected that the same men who burglarized the bank also robbed the loggers, however Luke May suspected the crimes were carried out by two separate pairs of thieves due to the statements made by the suspects at the logging camp during the robbery.

Following a lead from a woman in Quilcene, Jefferson County Sheriff Chase and his men located the suspects, Browning and "Texas Shorty" Grant who were involved in the bank burglary and shooting of Deputy McInnes. Browning surrendered and Grant leaped off the Quilcene bridge and into the brush where he was shot and fatally wounded. Browning's gun proved to be the one that shot Deputy McInnes but not logger, Ray Light. After his trial, Browning spent time in Walla Walla, dying there of tuberculosis.

Sheriff Nelson continued to search for the men who robbed the loggers and murdered Ray Light. During a search in the West End of Clallam County, Sheriff Nelson learned that two men meeting their description had been seen in Forks. Hoh River mailman Charlie Lewis noticed two strangers in an abandoned cabin and notified Sheriff Nelson. Sheriff Nelson asked for volunteer deputies in Forks to accompany him and Oscar Peterson of the Hoh volunteered. They found the cabin, kicked in the door and arrested Arthur King and George Roe who had the logger's money and the weapon used to kill Ray Light in their possession. They were brought to trial in Port Angeles on June 23, 1922. They were convicted and sentenced to Walla Walla for life.

OPERATIONS SECTION

The Operations section of the Clallam County Sheriff's Office includes Patrol, Detectives, Traffic, and Marine units. Staffed by highly trained law enforcement professionals, these individuals are available 24 hours a day to respond to the needs of our community.

Deputies are responsible for investigating and handling all crimes occurring in the unincorporated areas of Clallam County. A Deputy may respond to anything from a barking dog to a burglary in progress or a homicide. It is the Deputy's responsibility to be the first responder no matter the nature of the call, and deal with the situation until assistance can arrive.

The Clallam County Sheriff's office has four detachments. The detachments are located in Sequim, Port Angeles, Forks, and Clallam Bay. The one-man patrol concept is used in conjunction with Community Oriented Policing. The deputies are assigned to an individual car for call out availability. The deputies assist other agencies as well as receiving assistance from those agencies and have formed a mutual reliance.


The Patrol Team is part of the Operations Division and is made up of five squads with each led by a Patrol Sergeant. Four of the squads are in the Port Angeles-Sequim area and the fifth Squad comprises the West End area. There are a total of 26 Deputies in Patrol which includes one Sergeant and four to five Deputies per squad.

The Deputies patrol about 1,754 miles in Clallam County. Deputies handled about 17,884 Calls for Service in 2015. In a lot of ways, the Deputies worked with community members to resolve and minimize problems in well regarded working relationships.



DETACHMENT I - SEQUIM

THE SEQUIM DETACHMENT IS CO-LOCATED WITHIN THE SEQUIM POLICE DEPARTMENT AND IS KNOWN AS THE EAST END DETACHMENT. THE AREA HAS THE LARGEST POPULATION AND IS THE FASTEST GROWING OF ALL PARTS OF THE COUNTY.



Deputies respond to numerous calls for service from the numerous residential and suburban areas of this part of the county. Deputies assigned to this area provide Jamestown S'Kallam Tribe with law enforcement services and assist the Sequim Police Department.

DETACHMENT II – PORT ANGELES DETACHMENT

Detachment II is located at the county seat in Port Angeles and is the Sheriff's Office headquarters located in the Clallam County Courthouse.

The detachment extends to about the midway point between Port Angeles and Sequim to the east, and extends to the Twin Rivers area along the coast and Lake Crescent. To the south, the detachment is bordered by the Olympic National Park and to the north, the Straits of Juan de Fuca.

Deputies assigned to the area assist police officers from the Lower Elwha Klallam Tribe, Port Angeles Police Department, and the National Park Service. We entered an agreement with the Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe to handle all their Tribal Law En-



DETACHMENT III & IV WEST END DETACHMENT

Detachments III and IV are situated in the most northwestern corner of the county and, for that matter, the most northwestern part of the contiguous United States of America. Together, the two detachments cover over 1/2 of Clallam County and provide services to six communities and over 10,000 residents. Largely forested and unpopulated, the West End deputies are given resident status and respond to calls in the various communities. It is the largest area to patrol geographically.



The Forks Detachment office is currently located outside of Forks. Deputies assist the Forks Police Department, The Quileute Tribal Police in LaPush, Makah Tribal Police in Neah Bay, Department of Natural Resources, Olympic National Park, U.S. Coast Guard, and Jefferson County in a wide range of tasks.

The Forks area comprises the larger population of the West End and deputies reside there. The West End Deputies investigate and respond to calls in both detachments.

MARINE PATROL UNIT

THE MARINE PATROL UNIT IS STAFFED BY SPECIALLY TRAINED DEPUTIES WHO PATROL THE LAKES, STRAITS OF JUAN DE FUCA, AND THE PACIFIC OCEAN. 




FIREARMS TRAINING UNIT





CLALLAM COUNTY SHERIFF'S SEARCH AND RESCUE (SAR) IS A VOLUNTEER DIVISION OF THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT THAT RESPONDS TO EMERGENCY URBAN OR WILDERNESS SEARCH AND RESCUE CALLS 24 HOURS A DAY, 7 DAYS A WEEK. SAR MEMBERS ARE DEDICATED INDIVIDUALS WHO TRAIN IN MANY AREAS OF RESCUE WORK INCLUDING; SEARCH, RADIO COMMUNICATION, NAVIGATION, TRACKING, EMERGENCY MEDICINE, TECHNICAL RESCUE, AND WATER RESCUES.

EACH VOLUNTEER IS TRAINED AND TESTED TO NATIONAL SEARCH AND RESCUE STANDARDS AND PRACTICE YEAR ROUND TO STAY PROFICIENT FOR THE NUMEROUS AND SPECIALIZED TASKS THEY PERFORM THROUGHOUT THE YEAR. SAR IS HEADED BY SGT. LYMAN MOORES WHO ACTS AS THE SAR COORDINATOR FOR THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT.

MESSAGE FROM THE COMMANDER

The OPNET Program continues to be an important and successful law enforcement unit serving the needs of citizens in a two county area. Since 2012, this unit has excelled in its performance and productivity, mostly due to the supervision and quality of personnel assigned. Their dedication and tireless work ethic has propelled OPNET into the go to section for any agency in a two county area.

Funding remains questionable in each fiscal cycle. Seizures, once the foundation of a strong budget, are not what they once were. Legalization of marijuana and drug trends, such as methamphetamine, has contributed to the lack of valuable assets available to forfeit. Courts too have taken a harsher view of forfeitures forcing us to make different decisions when electing to seize property. To add to this, economic times and struggles are unprecedented in our history, and funding through grants and seizures is an increasing challenge. While other areas in our state are seeing some economic rebound, Clallam and Jefferson Counties continue to see difficulty. This has contributed to some property crime increase and may have some influence in the presence of controlled substance. Still, the executives that make up the Policy Board of OPNET have indicated a serious commitment in seeing that the program continues.

Because of the excellent support from our law enforcement executives, assigned investigators and staff and even the citizens of our area, OPNET will continue to be the effective unit it is for drug, gang and major crime enforcement for years to come.




OPNET is a multi-agency team dedicated specifically to the enforcement of narcotics laws in Clallam County. Contributors include Clallam County Sheriff's Office, Sheriff's Office, Port Angeles Police Dept., Sequim Police Dept., Washington State Patrol, and Border Patrol.



OPNET's primary focus is removing drug dealers from our community by identifying, locating, apprehending, and prosecuting suspects who deliver Heroin, methamphetamine, cocaine, and prescription medication such as Oxycodone. The past year there were 21 major arrests and convictions for drug trafficking and delivery.







WORDS FROM THE CHIEF



AS WE REFLECT BACK UPON THE PAST YEAR, I'M IMMEDIATELY DRAWN TO THE MANY SUCCESSES EXPERIENCED BY OUR CORRECTIONS SECTION. I AM ALSO REMINDED OF HOW PRIVILEGED I AM TO ENJOY THE OPPORTUNITY TO CONTINUE WORKING WITH AND SUPPORTING THE MANY PROFESSIONAL MEN AND WOMEN WORKING IN OUR JAIL.

DURING 2015 OUR JAIL MEDICAL STAFF BEGAN LAYING THE GROUNDWORK FOR IMPLEMENTATION OF A MEDICAL ASSISTED TREATMENT (MAT) PROGRAM FOR HEROIN ADDICTED INMATES. OUR COUNTY EXPERIENCED NUMEROUS HEROIN OVERDOSE DEATHS THROUGHOUT THE YEAR. THE MAT SHOULD PROVE TO BE A USEFUL TOOL IN COMBATING HEROIN ADDICTION.

THE PREA CAMERA PROJECT REMAINED ON TRACK AND HAS PROGRESSED TO THE POINT OF INSTALLATION WHICH IS SCHEDULED TO BEGIN IN OCTOBER OF 2016. A LONG TIME COMING BUT A CRITICAL ELEMENT TO OUR MAINTAINING COMPLIANCE WITH THE FEDERAL PREA STANDARDS.

ALSO DURING 2015 WE EXPERIENCED A NUMBER OF STAFFING CHANGES AS CORRECTIONS DEPUTY NATE CLARK MOVED TO THE OPERATIONS SECTION, CORRECTIONS DEPUTIES GARY GORSS AND KIMO VELLESES RESIGNED TO PURSUE OTHER ENDEAVORS AND PART TIME DEPUTIES RICK BRAY AND OWEN MCCANN MOVED TO FULL TIME STATUS.

2016 PROMISES TO BE ANOTHER CHALLENGING AND REWARDING YEAR AS WE PLAN TO GO LIVE WITH ELECTRONIC MEDICAL RECORDS (EPIC), EXPANSION OF VIDEO COURTS AND WASPC JAIL ACCREDITATION.







During 2015, CCSO continued to operate the Public Safety Radio Network (PSRN) which is the communications backbone for PenCom to use in dispatching Law Enforcement and participating Fire Services, also supporting the Emergency Operation Centers (EOC), Fire District 3, and Clallam Transit for radio service. This system is managed by Chief Civil Deputy Alice Hoffman with technical expertise from consultant Dave Zehrung and PenCom IT Specialist Jeff Christopher specializing in the wave portion of the network.

CCSO Radio Maintenance Team (RMT), Richard Tomko and Nick Ross, hired in early in 2014, continue support of the PSRN and Law Enforcement Dispatch Radio Network (LEDRN) systems. Their growing experience, technical backgrounds, and tower certifications are a huge advantage for system maintenance and upgrades for fixed radio sites throughout the county.

Past planning for reliability upgrades to enhance services in the West End are coming to fruition. Communications in this area is quite a challenge due to terrain and resources. Stage one started with the Forks tower grounding project to bring the site up to industry standards. A long needed project, this included installation of a ground halo and buss bars, while recapping transmission lines, antennas and lightning protection devices. With the help of grant monies for the next stages of this major project, subsequent work will add two more receive sites and a more robust simulcast voting system with redundant network backup for each site.

With a vehicle fleet averaging over 50 units strong this keeps the RMT busy. Radio system management and programming resources for deputy portables, patrol unit mobile systems and emergency management vehicles continue to be a high priority. This year a total of three new patrol vehicles replaced older units, and one emergency management vehicle (STAR) was introduced to the fleet. Each patrol vehicle was provided a standardized package of state of the art radios and antenna systems that posit the units for easy installation of advanced communications equipment including GPS, Cellular and Wi-Fi/Broadband based systems.

As the responsibilities continue to grow in the areas of continuity of services and data management, Richard and Nick continue part time service (while both working other jobs) they managed to put in a total of 1615 hours in 2015 in the following categories:





Sheriff's Office 2015 General Fund Budgets



OPERATION STONEGARDEN

2015 Grant Funding

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS), Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) is providing funds to enhance the capability of state and local unit of governments to prevent, deter, respond to, and recover from catastrophic and/or terrorist events through the Operation Stonegarden Program (OPSG). The OPSG Grant Program supports cooperation and coordination among our local Border Patrol and the local Tribal, Municipal, State and Federal law enforcement agencies in a joint mission to secure the United States' borders along routes of ingress, to include travel corridors along the Canadian and the International water borders.

Clallam County Sheriff's Office (CCSO) coordinates the OPSG funding and grant management with the U.S. Border Patrol in Blaine and the Washington State Emergency Homeland Security Program. CCSO writes the initial grant application and submits it ultimately to FEMA, which sends their approval and the amount of funding available to our county. We then disseminate the funding to CCSO, Forks Police Department, Lower Elwha Tribal Police, Makah Tribal Police, La Push Tribal Police, Sequim Police Department, Port Angeles Police Department and Washington State Patrol, based upon the number of sworn officers from each agency.

In 2015 Operation Stonegarden provided funding to upgrade Clallam Counties West end communication towers benefitting the Tribes, CCSO, Forks Police Department and any other agency who works in that area. Multiple radios were purchased by the agencies in that area to facilitate the communication. Port Angeles, Sequim and Forks purchased patrol vehicles with their funding and CCSO purchased an ATV, a UTV and a trailer to enhance their patrolling capabilities.

OPSG provided over 2500 hours of enhanced patrol throughout the county in 2015. Equipment purchased and the added manpower of "boots on the ground" have increased all of Clallam Counties' ability to obtain and provide information to Border Patrol and provide safer travel corridors and international waters.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT SECTION

Bill Carter, Emergency Communications Coordinator for the Clallam County Amateur Radio Emergency Services Operators (ARES) was our 2014 Volunteer of the year. Under his leadership, our corps of amateur radio emergency services operators has grown in numbers and in community projects. These volunteers logged over 2,500 miles to keep Clallam County emergency response and recovery ahead of the game in communications capability. Our outlying communication hubs have been built up to be able to receive and transmit communication traffic with further reach and more reliability. One of those new community outreach projects is their communication field work with the Great Olympic Adventure Trail (GOAT Race) Marathon out of Joyce. Our Clallam County ARES team was responsible for all communications for officials, workers, and athletes during this marathon along some very rural and isolated areas of Clallam County.

Under Sgt. John Keegan's direction, we have been able to expand our communication and command fleet to better respond to all hazard events throughout Clallam County by taking the Incident Command Vehicle, and our newly acquired OSCAR and NELLIE vehicles to the field command site of any incident. Each vehicle has communication equipment, incident command system capability, and mobility into all areas of Clallam County. Sgt. Keegan searched and researched vehicles and was able to capitalize on bringing these two new response vehicles to the Sheriff's Office at little to no costs. He personally worked to remodel the interiors of these vehicles to build all hazard response command and communication resources that can deploy whenever needed with VHF, UHF, and Amateur Radio capabilities.



COMMUNITY POLICING

The Clallam County Sheriff's Office is committed to Community Policing through partnerships with the citizens and businesses in the County. The basic concept of Community Policing is to bring together law enforcement and the public to work as a team in an effort to improve the community in which we all live. Community policing is an effective and proactive process which has proven to reduce crime, improve communication between the public and law enforcement as well as reduce the fear of crime.

Our Community Policing Team is led by Lorraine Shore, Administrative Coordinator and an amazing cadre of volunteers who donate thousands of hours each year to the Sheriff's Office. We have an active Neighborhood Watch program in Clallam County which is extremely successful thanks to our volunteers who dedicate their time and efforts to the citizens of Clallam County. Working in close partnership with the Port Angeles Police Department, Sequim Police Department, and Code Enforcement our Community Policing Team has made a significant impact on the quality of life for many of Clallam County's residents.

Each year the Sheriff's Office participates in events throughout the County designed to provide education to residents about the many services and programs the Sheriff's Office offers. The programs include Neighborhood Watch, Project Lifesaver, Radar Trailer, Map Your Neighborhood, Volunteers in Police Service, Anonymous Tip Reporting Service, CrimeReports.com and the Clallam County Alert System.

The Sheriff's Office holds an annual BBQ on Law Enforcement Memorial Day which brings together law enforcement officers from around the County to remember those who gave their lives in the line of duty. This BBQ is made possible through donations from community members and the hard work of the Sheriff's Volunteers who serve approximately 200 law enforcement personnel at the event.

The Sheriff's Office is honored to have 104 Volunteers who gave 10,903 hours of service to the Sheriff's Office and their Community in 2015. The 2015 Dollar Value of Volunteer Time for WA State = \$26.72 per hour which equates to a savings of \$291,393.00 to the Clallam County Sheriff's Office. Volunteers serve in the following areas:

2015 SCAM ALERTS

The Clallam County Sheriff's Office is committed to educating residents about crime prevention which includes providing information on current scams. In 2015, there were several scams targeting our citizens. We distributed this information through news releases and the Clallam County Sheriff's Office Facebook page.

IRS SCAM

Tax scams take many different forms. Recently, the most common scams are phone calls and emails from thieves who pretend to be from the IRS. They use the IRS name, logo or a fake website to try to steal your money. They may try to steal your identity too. Below are tips from the IRS to help you avoid being a victim of these tax scams:

The real IRS **will not**:

- Initiate contact with you by phone, email, text or social media to ask for your personal or financial information.
- Call you and demand immediate payment. The IRS will not call about taxes you owe without first mailing you a bill.
- Require that you pay your taxes a certain way. For example, telling you to pay with a prepaid debit card.

JURY DUTY SCAM

Several Sunland Neighborhood residents have contacted Sheriff's Deputies to report they are receiving phone calls from 360-214-3146 and told they have to pay a fine for missing Jury Duty. This is a recurring scam that goes around the country at various times and it appears from the cluster of calls the scammers have managed to obtain a directory of Sunland residents as they have knowledge of names and information regarding the resident's families to make them appear legitimate.

The Sheriff's Office would like to advise everyone to immediately hang up when receiving these types of unsolicited calls as the scammers are well trained in ways to persuade people to stay on the phone and have just enough information to appear as though they are legitimate. Please do not give out any personal information to anyone to avoid being victimized in these scams.

RENTAL SCAM

A Port Angeles resident was recently victimized by a Rental Scam on Craigslist and after discovering the scam alerted the Sheriff's Office to this issue. To learn how to avoid Rental Scams and others please visit the Federal Trade Commission's website.

MICROSOFT SCAM

A Sequim resident called to report she received a call from someone claiming to be from Microsoft who told her to give him her personal information so he could access her computer and "fix" it for her. The best advice is not to give out ANY personal information to someone on the phone and hang up on unsolicited phone calls.

CRIME PREVENTION

Crime prevention is the central focus of the Clallam County Sheriff's Office Community Policing Program. The goal is to educate all residents of Clallam County on how to prevent becoming a victim of crime as well as how to effectively communicate with law enforcement.

This is accomplished through the Neighborhood Watch Program which has been very successful in Clallam County. In 2015, the Clallam County Sheriff's Office gave 20 Neighborhood Watch presentations throughout Clallam County. The presentations were given by Sheriff Benedict, Sgt. Randy Pieper, Neighborhood Watch Coordinator Al Camin and Community Policing Coordinator Lorraine Shore. Each presentation focused on the specific issues the residents were having in their neighborhood. Information included how to target harden their homes and property, analysis of crimes in Clallam County and their particular area as well as how to effectively communicate with law enforcement.

The Sheriff's Office uses a variety of methods to communicate with residents—Clallam County Sheriff's Office Facebook Page, Website, Anonymous Tip Reporting Database, Clallam County Alert System as well as the many events the Sheriff's Office participates in throughout the year.

In 2015, the Sheriff's Office had educational booths at the Port Angeles Home Show, Forks Family Fun Fair, Clallam County Fair and the Home Depot Safety Fair. The Sheriff's Office also participated in the Elwha Kids Safety Fair and hosted a Law Enforcement Memorial BBQ.

PROJECT LIFESAVER

The Clallam County Sheriff's Office is a Project Lifesaver agency. Project Lifesaver is a LoJack Safety Net tracking system used by law enforcement departments nationwide. The tracking system locates adults and children who wander due to Alzheimer's, Dementia, Autism, Down syndrome and other related cognitive impairment diagnoses.

Participants wear a transmitter on their ankle or wrist, this transmitter is about the size of a watch, which emits an individualized tracking signal on an assigned radio frequency. When caregivers notify Dispatch that the participant is missing, a team of specially-trained Sheriff's Office personnel responds and uses a mobile locator tracking system to search for the missing person.

The transmitter is a battery-operated radio wrist transmitter emitting an automatic tracking signal every second, 24 hours a day. The signal is tracked on the ground over approximately one mile. Each wristband has a unique radio frequency. Project Lifesaver's battery provides a continuous signal for 30-45 days.

The Clallam County Sheriff's Office has approximately ten clients on the Project Lifesaver program at any given time. Efforts are made continuously through news releases and radio programs to advertise this life saving program to the community.




